Facilities:

Projects accomplished at the Chapel since September, 2024 include completing the repointing of the main façade of the building; installing 200 amp service including a new power pole, electrical entry and breaker box; refinishing the floors in the side room and front of the sanctuary; installing video and sound for spillover seating in the side room; a replacement dehumidifier in the kitchen; reconfiguring our parking lot to make more efficient use of that space and improve access for people with difficulty walking; power washing and mortar repairs to the stairs behind the chapel; replacing all the incandescent bulbs in the sanctuary; and installing a new water line from the well to the rear of the building. All safety upgrades recommended by the fire marshal's inspection last summer including replacing the water heater have been completed except for installing carbon monoxide detectors, which are on order. Tree trimming on both sides of the Chapel and leveling the walkway near the side entrance are scheduled to take place within the next few weeks.

The Manse has required relatively little work other than routine maintenance this year. However, the quality and reliability of the Manse water supply demands attention. We are in the process of assessing our options and hope to have a plan and cost estimate for a major upgrade to present to the Finance Committee as part of the 2026 budget formulation process. We will also need to address the condition of the Manse windows fairly soon. They are all original, wooden, and showing their age.

Many thanks to the diligent committee members and other volunteers who have stepped forward to help manage our big projects, as well as other necessary equipment purchases and small fixes far too numerous to mention.

Finance:

The last meeting of the Finance Committee was on July 6th. We dealt with a number of issues including:

- How to deal with undesignated gifts of over \$1000 (they are few in number and go into Chapel operations)
- How to get an independent review of the Chapel's Financial Statements (a work in progress)
- Restricted gifts and special appeals (there are accounting restrictions that limit our ability to freely ask for these, so we developed a number of suggestions to achieve the same level of support)
- Donor Privacy (also a work in progress)
- Development of a donor database enabling the sending of year-end letter to donors giving over \$250 via checks (starting in 2026)
- A very preliminary discussion of revisiting the policy of a 50-50 split between operations and Outreach for Sunday plate donations.

Since then, there have been a number of discussions about Fundraising strategy in general, and we have received some valuable material from Weston. This is a subject we will be pursuing in the coming months.

Financial reports will be submitted by Meridyth Burrows and an update on the Endowments will be sent by Bill Locke.

Flowers:

Flowers continue to be managed by a team this year: Gayle is the primary contact person, monitors the online requests, payments and ordering of altar flowers. Joan Robinson picks up the arrangements, brings them to the chapel and returns the vases each week. Susie Nettleton created and tends the beautiful outdoor planters. We also have help from other volunteers when needed.

Flowers are provided by Mountain Greenery. Arrangements continue to cost \$60 per vase. This year we added the option to sponsor an outdoor planter. To date all vases and planters have been paid for by donors and only 2 remaining Sundays are open. In the event no flowers are donated we would use the flower budget to purchase a vase.

We continue to work with the webmaster to improve the online request and payment process while maintaining the option to pay by check.

The committee requested a budget of \$1500 to cover Sundays with no donors, delivery charges when flowers can't be picked up, cost of the plants for the outdoor planters and other contingencies. As of July 31, no budgeted funds have been spent.

Mathias Music Endowment Fund:

The Mathias Music Endowment Fund was established in memory of Fred and Cleta Mathias to perpetuate the strong music program of the Big Moose Community Chapel, to encourage talent in the arts, and to subsidize Chapel Musical performances. Since 1999 the fund has supported the studies of 23 students in a wide variety of disciplines in music and the arts and has also subsidized musical performances at Big Moose Community Chapel and other nearby venues.

The Mathias Endowment committee has been proud to support Olivia's musical journey over the past 10 years – from lessons to undergraduate studies at the Crane School of Music at SUNY Potsdam, to a Master of Music from the University of Texas at Austin, and currently while pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts at the Herb Alpert School of Music at UCLA.

In keeping with the missions of the Fund, this year the committee allocated awards as follows:

Membership / Database:

From the outset, this database has been run on Claris FileMaker Pro and is maintained with frequent updates by Richard Widdicombe. Various information is kept including name and home address, home phone, email, lake location if relevant etc. It is possible to tag people in the database to produce a Choir list, Members of Trustees, separate people with only emails or only physical mailing addresses etc. Mailing labels can be produced as well as name tags.

We gather new names usually by people filling out our printed yellow cards. These are either dropped in the collection plate or mailed to the Administrator. There are instructions on the card for people to enroll <u>separately</u> in the electronic email list. These people then may receive weekly informational blasts. This is optional. This system automatically removes any "bounced" emails or emails that are not regularly opened.

The Chapel uses the U.S. Post Office to send several physical mailings each year: two Newsletters, an Annual Appeal letter etc. By doing this, we can regularly detect changes of addresses and update our files. Changes in email addresses are problematic and depend upon people to alert us to their new email.

Although Richard Widdicombe is the keeper of the Master File, a mirror file is kept by Bill Burrows, Jr. Changes and corrections are also contributed by Judy Bean, Mary Moore, Mark Mayer and Susan Taylor.

As of 11 August 2025 there are 380 Family addresses recorded. The database can also be printed as a directory.
