Balsam Bee:

The Balsam Bee was held August 1 and enjoyed wonderful and steady attendance with new Saturday morning hours starting at 9 a.m. and the Bee ending at 1:00 p.m. Special thanks to Lorraine Schunck for the suggestion of morning hours, which the committee has called a great success and is our new Bee tradition. Guests were arriving by 8:45 and estimates put attendance at well over 100.

The best estimate is that 310 new pillows were stuffed and sewn and around 40 "vintage" Chapel pillows were restuffed and sewn--some of those coming from as far away as Colorado and Vermont and some from as close as Inlet and the north shore of Big Moose Lake. Restuffing is definitely something we'll offer at the next Bee.

Thanks to everyone who cut balsam, worked the grinders, stuffed, sewed, sold pillows at the Bee and afterwards and most importantly, to everyone who shared Chapel hospitality with Bee guests. Every "Hello," "Welcome," "Where are you from?" and "Let me show you how to do that" is our warmest and best invitation to return to the Chapel in the future.

Facilities:**Chapel Updates**

- Walkway repairs: Sunken and shifted slates at the side entrance walkway were removed, the base was prepped, and the slates were releveled to address a potential trip hazard for the congregation. A bid is in hand to continue this work — removing all remaining cracked and sunken stones, prepping the base, and releveled — and we are awaiting a second bid before proceeding.

- Electrical: The 60A subpanel in the Chapel kitchen was replaced with a 32-circuit, 100A main breaker panel. Carbon monoxide detectors were also installed.
- Stone repointing: This project will continue this fall and is roughly three-quarters complete. While on site, the crew will also inspect the capstone to help identify the source of a small leak; they will need to rent a lift to examine the capstone.
- Door refinishing: The Chapel's wooden doors — a focal point of the building — need refinishing due to water staining on the lower sections. A bid is in hand to refinish the double doors and the single side-entrance door so they match, and we hope to secure a second estimate soon.
- Grill/fire pit: We anticipate beginning construction of a new grill and fire pit for the Guides Dinner, a favorite Chapel tradition, and look forward to continuing it once the project is complete.
- Tree removal: A large dead tree in the parking lot has been identified as a hazard. Qualified, insured tree service providers are assessing the job this week.

Manse Updates

- New well: A new dug well has been installed at the Manse, resolving a long-standing concern about water supply. The project was fully funded by two generous Big Moose Chapel congregants.
- Window replacement: The Manse's original wooden windows are in significant need of replacement or repair. We would like to begin this project soon but will need to fundraise, given the number of windows involved.
- Upstairs toilet leak: A leak required pulling the upstairs toilet, replacing the floorboards, and installing a new toilet. The leak also damaged ceiling panels below, which will need to be replaced.
- Breakwall / waterfront: A bid is in hand for improving the breakwall and waterfront area, and we are awaiting a second bid this fall. This is not considered urgent but is something to consider for the future.

Finance:

The Finance Committee met on July 9, with all members in attendance except Mark Mayer and Steve Schanely present.

Bill Locke gave a report on the performance of the endowment through Aug 6. The total return is 6.9% overall with a return of 11.14% for equities alone. 59.28% is invested in equities, 37.15% in fixed income, and 3.58% in cash and equivalents. The total endowment balance is \$2,062,474. The Committee unanimously approved continuing to have AFS under Bill Locke manage the Chapel portfolios.

The financial status of the Chapel is solid. In July we received three individual checks totaling \$20,000, and year-to-date donations excluding special projects is \$36,800. The Manse well special project is more than fully funded, although we have a “way to go” on funding the new fire pit. Expenses are on budget, and our cash balance on July 31 as \$38,085 (including the \$20,000 draw from the Endowment in June). Susan and Jay Taylor gave a report on their meetings with Lucy Popkess and Lauren Wright from Genesis, a non-profit raising consultancy, regarding a potential Capital Campaign in connection with the anniversaries of the Manse next year and Chapel in 2031. A lot of useful advice was provided by them, and in subsequent discussion with the Committee, including, importantly, defining the need for funds, including long term plans for the upkeep and capital investment needs of the Manse and Chapel and possible investment in growing the Chapel congregation, a thorough study of giving trends and expenses, and of the endowment returns, uses of funds, distributions, etc.. Also, importantly, the Trustees will need to be thoroughly educated on the finances of the Chapel. It was suggested that the quiet phase of a possible campaign not begin until 2028. Depending on the size of a campaign, an outside consultant could be advisable, particularly in the area of Legacy giving.

Outreach Policy. The Committee addressed John View’s suggestion from the July meeting that, rather than implementing the policy approved at the July meeting to have the flexibility of budgeting Outreach at a minimum of 25% of the prior year’s Sunday plate with a target of 50%, that the Outreach budget be decoupled from the previous year’s Sunday plate. This could mean budgeting Outreach for the coming year based on various factors including the Outreach Committee’s assessment of the needs of the community, historical Outreach budgets, and income and expenses from the prior year and needs anticipated for the year. The Committee’s recommendation will be presented to the Trustees.

The Committee discussed the Balsam Bee, the Guide’s dinner and the Bazaar as fundraising events. The Committee recommends a review of income and expenses for the various Bazaar activities to facilitate planning and budgeting the next Bazaar, and is gathering data to support that effort.

Flowers:

Flowers continue to be managed by a team this year: Gayle is the primary contact person, monitors the online requests, payments and ordering of altar flowers. Joan Robinson picks up the arrangements, brings them to the chapel and returns the vases each week. Susie Nettleton created and tends the beautiful outdoor planters. We also have help from other volunteers when needed.

Flowers are provided by Mountain Greenery. Arrangements continue to be \$65 per vase. This year we continued the new option to sponsor an outdoor planter. To date all vases and planters have been paid for by donors and all remaining Sundays have donors. In the event no flowers are donated we would use the flower budget to purchase a vase. We continue to work with the webmaster to improve the online request and payment process while maintaining the option to pay by check.

The committee requested a budget of \$1700. Most of costs are covered by donations of flower sponsors. The budget also provides for funds to cover Sundays with no donors, delivery charges when flowers can't be picked up, cost of the plants for the outdoor planters and other contingencies. As of July 31, no budgeted funds have been spent.

Highlights Include:

- Enhancements to the BMCC Gifts Policy, Privacy Policy and Gifts & Memorials Committee Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) were updated to allow the Trustee Chair of the Gifts & Memorials Committee to have visibility to donors for the purpose of providing thanks and being the liaison with the donor for any specific asks related to their gift. The Gifts Chair will also work across committees to align committees to a proposal regarding any proposed designated gifts. Trustees will then approve acceptance of a designated gift ensuring the related accounting, responsibility and communications is established both within the Board and with the donor.
- Five new plaques were commissioned over the winter, and are being installed this summer season in the Sanctuary. The Pew Plaque Directory will be updated to include their locations.
- Please share knowledge of any community member passings so we may remember them next summer at our Memorial Service the 2nd Sunday in August. Please contact Sarah Winch with input.
- We celebrate the new coat rack handcrafted by Jack Nettleton for our side room entrance. Last summer, after the beautiful new floors were finished, there was concern expressed about raincoats and umbrellas. Jack offered to craft something that would allow those wet items to be handled. It is a spectacular piece of craftsmanship!

Mathias Music Endowment Fund:

The Mathias Memorial Endowment Fund was established in memory of Fred and Clela Mathias to perpetuate the strong music program of the Big Moose Community Chapel, to encourage talent in the arts, and to subsidize Chapel Musical performances. Since 1999 the fund has supported the studies of 23 students in a wide variety of disciplines in music and the arts and has also subsidized musical performances at Big Moose Community Chapel and other nearby venues.

This summer one of our awardees, Lily SlatonBarker-Wong returned to play for Sunday worship as well as to present a recital during our Summer Music Series. The Mathias Endowment committee has been proud to support Lily's musical journey over the past couple years as she completed a Master of Music in Violin Performance at the University of Oregon. At her recital, we were honored to present her an award for the coming school year as she begins pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts in Viola Performance at UO.

In keeping with the missions of the Fund, the committee allocated resources as follows:

- \$250 to Scott Rutledge for trumpet accompaniment and performance during worship on Sunday, July 5.
- \$250 to Jake SlatonBarker-Wong for piano performance during worship on Sunday, July 26.
- \$1000 to Olivia Phaneuf for studies at UCLA toward a Doctor of Musical Arts in Saxophone Performance.
- \$1000 to Lily SlatonBarker-Wong for studies at the University of Oregon toward a
- Doctor of Musical Arts in Viola Performance.

Membership / Database:

Since 1996, this database has been run on Claris FileMaker Pro and is maintained with frequent updates by Richard Widdicombe. Various information is kept including name and home address, home phone, email, lake location if relevant etc. It is possible to tag people in the database to produce a Choir list, Members of Trustees, separate people with only emails or only physical mailing addresses etc. Mailing labels can be produced as well as name tags.

We gather new names usually by people filling out our printed yellow cards. These are either dropped in the collection plate or mailed to the Administrator. There are instructions on the card for people to enroll separately in the electronic email list. These people then may receive weekly informational blasts. This is optional.

The Chapel uses the U.S. Post Office to send several physical mailings each year: two Newsletters, an Annual Appeal letter etc. By doing this, we can regularly detect changes of addresses and update our files. Changes in email addresses are problematic and depend upon people to alert us to their new email.

For 30 years Richard Widdicombe has been the keeper of the Master File, a mirror file is kept by Bill Burrows, Jr. Changes and corrections are also contributed by Judy Bean, Mary Moore, and Mark Mayer.

As of 17 August 2026 there are 406 Family addresses recorded. This is an increase of 26 names since 2025.

Outreach:

Highlights Include:

- Outreach Donation Baskets are located in the Narthex this summer, collecting goods for the Old Forge Library Food Pantry. They received a grant to remodel their space and the news article included a list of their greatest needs.
 - As you attend chapel the remainder of the season, please consider donating to this cause with non-perishable foods, toiletries or laundry products

- Old Forge Library Food Pantry Greatest Needs List: cooking oil, mayonnaise, canned chili, hearty soups and stews, canned fruit such as applesauce, shampoo, dish soap, laundry detergent, mouthwash and canned pasta
- Feedback from an employee of the Library who also sings in our choir is that the donations received so far this summer are greatly appreciated. The demand is very high.
- A total of \$12,730 from the Summer 2025 plate will be distributed to local agencies this September, 2026. If time to include those final allocations in the fall newsletter we will do so, otherwise it will be in the spring edition.
- Consideration of information about BMCC Outreach posting information on the website is a topic to be decided this fall.
- The Outreach budget for 2027 will be planned as a line item in the operating budget next year, so this is the final year that a percent of the plate will be allocated. Our process will switch from getting a dollar amount and splitting it out across agencies to leaning into understanding our agencies' strategies and anticipated needs to submit a budget request like all other committees do in the budgeting process. This should streamline our processes and allow us a greater opportunity to understand and help needs going forward.
- This summer, under the stewardship of Anne Dew, the Outreach Committee is piloting youth making the calls to agencies to inquire about how they serve the community and how a donation would be used in their mission.

Website:

Working in conjunction with the Publicity/Communications Committee, the Website Committee continued to support the sharing of Chapel information.

The Publicity/Communications Committee developed a summer email schedule highlighting the season's events. Together with the Monday "Coming This Week" email, this kept Chapel members informed on a timely basis. The Website Committee works hard to distribute pertinent information about Chapel life once a week; occasionally, a committee chair requests a separate mailing about their committee's activities. Each such request is carefully weighed to respect our subscribers' inboxes.

We continue to encourage new Chapel members to sign up for email communications through the Chapel website and in-person at the Chapel. We've seen strong growth as a result — about 30 new subscribers since May 1, 2026. Emails now reach an average of 254 recipients, with a 99% delivery rate and an 82% open rate. (Religious organizations typically average around a 30% open rate.) Of those views, 80% occur on desktop computers and 20% on mobile devices. The website would not be nearly as beautiful without the artwork and skills of Mary Moore.
